
The Hired Girl



With the rise of the Berlin Wall, twelve -year-old Gerta finds her family suddenly divided. She, her mother, and her brother Fritz live on the eastern side, controlled by the Soviets. Her father and middle brother, who had gone west in search of work, cannot



return home. One day, Gerta spots her father motioning to her on a viewing platform on the western side, and concludes that he wants Gerta and Fritz to tunnel beneath the wall, out of East Berlin.

The Seventh Most Important Thing

After Arthur's father died, Arthur struggles to cope with the loss of a man he loved and feared. One day he can't control his anger and he throws a brick at the local garbage picker - the Junk Man - and is ordered by the court to serve community service with the Junk Man. The

Eventually Arthur enters the old garage and realizes there's more to the Junk Man than meets the eye, and the "trash" he's collecting is being transformed into something more precious than anyone could imagine. . . .
